Part B – Short Answer

4. The Wilsons often welcome other people into their tiny room and treat them kindly. Give two examples of when the Wilsons welcome others.

Example - The Wilsons welcome Mr. Brown the traveling salesman in and give him company; the Wilsons welcomed the band What and give them some quiet relaxation; the Wilsons welcome Gavin and give him encouragement and advice about Cathy; the Wilsons welcome Mrs. Goldengate and give her space to slow down.

5. Why do the Wilsons decide to have a dinner party? Who do they invite?

Example - The Wilsons want to get Cathy and Gavin together, so they have a dinner party. Their hope is that Gavin will make the most of the opportunity and strike up a conversation with Cathy. They invite all the friends they've made in the hotel: Gavin, Cathy, Mr. Brown, and Mrs. Goldengate.

6. In Chapter 14, what is Mr. Brown's plan for getting to spend more time with his own family?

Example - Mr. Brown is looking for a fad to market so that he can spend more time at home. When the Wilsons become famous for helping Lizzy Chronicle, Mr. Brown gets the idea to call them the Elevator Family and sell dolls, books, lunch boxes, and sweatshirts about them. He will make enough money to spend more time at home.

Part C – Long Answer

7. Choose two characters from the book outside of the Wilson family. Explain how the Wilsons help these two characters. Use at least two details from the story in your answer.

Example - The Wilsons help Gavin and Mrs. Goldengate. For Gavin, they encourage him to talk to Cathy and ask her out on a date. Though it takes some time, he does it and Cathy agrees to go out with him. For Mrs. Goldengate, the Wilsons remind her of how wonderful family is. So instead of rushing around, she plans to spend time with her own family in Montana. (Specific examples will vary.)
